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Letter of the President of FEPS

Dear Colleagues,

In previous FEPS Newsletters we have focused much on the joint FEPS meetings with the national Societies. In the years of the IUPS congresses, FEPS will not arrange any meetings in Europe, but instead urges the European physiologists to attend the International Congress in large numbers to make it what is intended: an international platform for physiologists. To reach that goal these Congresses have to be large – a "critical mass" must be reached to make these meetings valuable for all participants. National Societies have a critical position here. Without a sizable amount of travel grants there will not be a sufficient number of young scientists participating in these meeting. In a questionnaire from the IUPS Long Range Planning Committee FEPS argued for the importance in maintaining these large international meetings every 4th year, but also stressed the responsibility of the National Societies for support. This issue should be added to the Agenda of Boards of all National Societies. The next IUPS meeting will take place in Kyoto in 2009, and the following is planned for United Kingdom in 2013. Here FEPS will become a partner to secure a full European participation.

During the summer there has also been another European Union hearing on the possible impact of a revision of Directive 86/609/EEC on the protection of animals used for experimental and other scientific purposes. FEPS certainly does welcome efforts to reach effective and common rules securing an optimal protection of animals. However, several new regulations may become time consuming and costly to implement. All parties concerned - physiological research certainly is one of those – should critically follow the EU initiatives regarding new regulations in order to adapt in time.
